President's Report: (Chuck LaMantia)

With a quorum present Chuck LaMantia called the meeting to order at 7:39PM.

Chuck asked that we hear presentations from three charities before continuing our regular meeting. The three charities are: 826CHI, Mighty Acorns Program and Northern Illinois Food Bank.

Charity Presentations

Northern Illinois Food Bank

Presented by Monica Marr

Northern Illinois Food Bank Assets \$31,593,109 Revenue \$137,972,846

NIFB is a not-for-profit, tax exempt, Illinois-organized 501(c) (3) charitable organization that purchases, collects, stores, and distributes food sufficient during FY2015 to have served approximately 57 million meals in 13 Illinois counties. This includes 61,247 backpacks of food distributed to hungry children; 699,581 afterschool meals and snacks; 288,929 summer program meals; and holiday meal boxes for 35,227 families. 58% of NIFB's revenue and support (cash and other assets, excluding donated food) comes from donor contributions, and 97% of its operating expenses are incurred through food bank operations.

NIFB operates a number of charitable programs, including fresh milk to food pantries (Milk2MyPlate), farmers' market-style mobile food pantries that travel to high-need communities (Mobile Pantry), and child nutrition, afterschool snack, and supper programs (Child Nutrition). Donations can be earmarked to one or more programs as the donor deems appropriate.

826CHI

826CHI IMC.NFP; Assets \$139,548 Income \$431,495

826CHI is an Illinois 501(c) (3) not-for-profit that is an affiliate of 826 National, which also has chapters in Los Angeles, San Francisco, Boston, New York City, Detroit and Ann Arbor, MI, and Washington, D.C. As with the other chapters, 826CHI is focused on developing the writing skills and creative writing of youngsters aged 6 through 18, and also works with teachers to help inspire their students to write. Its core mission is that strong writing skills are fundamental to future success, and that devoted, 1-on-1 attention can result in substantial advances in overall learning success.

Located in Chicago's Wicker Park area, 826CHI offers free after-school tutoring, sponsors creative writing workshops, provides in-school support and help for English language learners, and also offers assistance with student publications. 826CHI has over 350 volunteers who regularly devote their time and talents to further its programs, and serves nearly 4,000 students annually.

For FY 2016, 826CHI had \$534,263 in total revenue (of which \$203,152 was earned income, and \$113,297 was fundraising) and \$480,087 in expenses, of which 83% were program expenses, 11% were on fundraising expenses, and 6% was attributable to management and administrative. To put this into perspective, a donation of \$250 pays for a two-hour workshop session on anything from stop-motion animation to college

essay writing; a \$500 donation allows a class of 30 elementary school students to write, illustrate, and publish an original story concerning the group's Storytelling & Bookmaking Field Trip; and a \$1,000 donation offers one student the opportunity to receive dedicated support during the After-School Tutoring & Writing program for an entire year.

Mighty Acorns Program, The Conservation Foundation

The Conservation Foundation Assets: \$6,220,741 Revenue \$2,558,755

The Mighty Acorns program is an environmental education curriculum for 3rd-5th graders, supported by the Conservation Foundation that incorporates classroom curriculum, hands-on restoration and exploration activities, with classroom and outdoor activities during the fall, winter, and spring seasons.

The classroom program, provided at a number of schools throughout the Chicagoland area, is coordinated with local park districts, forest preserves, and nature centers to help with and provide stewardship activities in natural areas near the students' home and school areas. The goal of the program is to foster a lifelong connection with and an appreciation of the environment and the need to preserve and protect prairie, woodland, and wetland habitats.
