

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Rallye 'Round the Region

Spring is almost here and the first rallye of the year is almost upon us. When you register to participate in the rallye, you will be asked to enter a class. The following will be helpful in determining which class you should

Classes are used to separate groups of contestants from each other by criteria, which may differ, depending on the group or car club responsible for the rallye. Since the criteria are quite different, we are going to talk only about the criteria defining the classes for rallyists who are competing in the Chicago Region PCA rallye events.

RALLYE CLASSES, NOTES AND DEFINITIONS are found in the CHICAGO REGION, PCA, MEMBER-

SHIP DIRECTORY for the current year. Briefly, the classes are: SEAT OF THE PANTS (SOP)/ UNEQUIPED CLASS. This class allows only simple timepiece, including solid state stopwatches, pencil and paper. EQUIPED/NAVIGATIONAL AIDS CLASS. This class includes SOP material plus Rallye tables, slide Be sure to attend the Rallye School ruler, circular type slide and navigational aid of any type plus any mechanical device, i.e., calculator, computer, Curta, Halda, etc.

TOURING CLASS OR NOVICE CLASS. This class is not listed in the directory. This class is up to the score. If you are not a rallyist, but Rallymaster. The Rallymaster, giving helpful hints that allow the novice rallyists to stay on course, prepares the Route Instructions. They are able to note the traps and complete the rallye correctly and hopefully they have a learning experience. This and that will be your chance to get is a non-competitive class.

If you are a novice (first time rallyist), please consider entering this class if available. Beginner rallyists should make it their primary objective to stay on the Rallymaster's

course and not worry about their average speed and the speed changes. Use the clock for pauses and for timing in and out of checkpoints. You can keep average speeds all day, but if you are off course you are lost, and your speed will not make any difference.

on Sunday, March 12th. We will be discussing traps and we will take a short pencil and paper rallye. You will learn how to complete your score card by entering information from checkpoint slips and figuring your want to take part on rallye day, attend the school and we will show you how to be a good checkpoint worker including familiarizing yourself with the rallye clocks.

The first rallye is the 2nd of April your car out and see how well you can do on a rallye.


We are in need of photos for the cover. If you have a nice portrait of your car that you'd like to see on the cover, please send it to us.

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Autocross 2000-Don't hit the pylons

President Bill Murrin has once again selected us as Autocross coordinators for 2000 and we have a great year planned for you. We will be revisiting the Utica Go Kart Track (where you can't get lost), Lake Geneva and Rockford speedways, and some other venues to be announced. There will be five races in all.

If you don't know, autocross-

ing is the fine art of driving through a closed course against a clock. Some call it solo racing or gymkhanas. You compete against other cars similar to yours, but you are alone on the track. In the Chicago Region PCA we use the following bumping schedule (which is also printed in your 2000 club registry) for making classes. Three cars make a class. P1 356, 914 (except 914/6), 912,



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Concouring with PCA Chicago (some helpful hints for the beginner)

Know what class you and your Porsche are capable of. If you enter D class at your first event you can move up. If you enter into A class you will not be able to move down a class within the same year. If you enter as a Novice, your Porsche will be judged as a C class car.

Use the score sheet as a guide. Don't spend a lot of time

cleaning the engine if the class you are entering will not be judging that area. Concentrate on the area being judged.

No matter how clean you think your car is, someone else will find an area that you missed. So, have another auto enthusiast help you with your final inspection a week before the concours.

The question that everyone asks is what kind of products should be used to clean the pride and joy. Let's face it, there is no magical product that will clean your Porsche. It takes lots of time, plenty of old fashioned elbow grease, and products that you feel comfortable using that will not be too harsh on your Porsche.

Don't be a daredevil! The parts that are gold cad are very sensitive (as I later found out). I often try new products on my daily driver.

If they work the way I expected, then I will use the product on a small area of my Porsche.


Be sure to get to the concours early enough so you have plenty of time to register, park, unpack, and do your final prep.

Keep in mind that the judges are only human and some are more critical than others. So don't be discouraged if your hard work was not recognized as much as you had anticipated. Go to at least three or four events before you throw in the towel to concouring. By all means, don't be afraid to ask questions. Porsche club is all about helping one another learn more about our cars in a fun and enjoyable way. Concouring is just one of the many ways we do that.

Brakes at Blackhawk

Brakes, Brakes, and More Brakes

In the thirty-one years I have been the event chairman of Blackhawk Farms Drivers' Education events, I have learned a few things. I admit I am very stubborn and I have never made Phi Beta Kappa, but I have learned the most important thing you can have at Blackhawk is brakes, brakes, and more brakes.

Blackhawk is a short 1.8 mile track and your brakes do not have the chance to cool down as much as they would at tracks such as Road America. The fastest Porsche out there accelerates from zero to sixty in about five seconds. The slowest one out there decelerates from sixty to zero in about three seconds. What does this tell you? The brake pedal is much more important than the loud (go fast, accelerator) pedal. As I don't want to pull your car from the weeds at corner one because your brakes went away or you boiled your brake fluid, please pay attention to the following recommendations.

Brakes stop a car by slowing its forward motion by friction of the brake pads against the rotor. This, of course, produces heat, intense heat. The faster the stop, the higher the heat. This heat must go somewhere. It goes into the air, the rotor, the pads, and the brake fluid.

I am not an engineer (although I play one on TV.), but I

have been informed that brakes work best at a temperature of around 900 degrees Fahrenheit. This heat wears down pads at a fast rate. It is for this reason that semimetallic (race pads) and carbon fiber pads were developed. These pads are terrific for the track, but not very good for the street as they do not like to work until they reach 500 degrees—difficult to achieve on the street. Therefore, my first recommendation is for a new set of factory pads.

Not only are the factory pads better for the street, but they also do not wear your rotors as quickly. Please be aware that it takes some time to "bed" in your new pads and your old rotors. For that matter, it takes time on new rotors too. Pads and rotors must get used to each other. I recommend several hundred street miles or at least five moderate laps around the track before any hot laps. It's sort of like dating before marriage.

The average driver at Black-hawk will log close to 120 miles on the track in one day. This is equivalent to 70% of the life of a set of street pads. See why I recommend that you have a good set of pads before you show up?

Next, and possibly even more important is you brake fluid. The function of brake fluid is to cause the pads to squeeze the rotor, slowing the car. As I mentioned earlier, this causes heat, intense heat. Much of this heat is transferred to the brake fluid. The important thing about brake fluid is that it boils. When it boils, and you attempt to apply the brakes, you will not stop. Most brake fluid boils at around 400 degrees. Fortunately, the fluid in your Porsche is better than that.

Brake fluid will get old, dirty,

and begin to absorb water. We all know at what temperature water boils. I'm still not an engineer and I know what that number is. I recommend that you change your brake fluid and put in a high performance glycol-fluid (not silicone) that will meet or exceed DOT 5 standards. This will increase the boiling point to 500 degrees or more. I do not recommend silicone brake fluid. I know that it has a very high boiling point (700 degrees) and does not absorb water. However, I dislike it because it eats up rubber seals and may give a spongy fell to the brake pedal. Unless you want to change all your seals and go serious racing, do not use it. Besides, it is more difficult to bleed.

Please follow these humble few inexpensive brake recommendations and change your engine oil prior to coming out to Blackhawk. For engine oil, I recommend 20W50 or a straight 40 weight motor oil. If you do so, you can expect a much better day at the track.

Blackhawk Farms Raceway, South Beloit, IL Thursday May 18, 2000—Experienced Blackhawk drivers ONLY. Friday, May 19, 2000—Novices, Women, & Instructors* ONLY.

Blackhawk Farms Raceway is a nine turn 1.8 mile enclosed high speed track located in South Beloit, just outside of Rockton, Illinois close to the Northwest Tollway.

Mandatory clothing for all drivers at this event include a Snell approved SA 1990 helmet, long sleeve shirt, long pants, and socks, all made of non-synthetic material, and closed toe shoes. Recommended, but not necessary items include driving suits, driving gloves, driving shoes, and protective neck brace all made of Nomex or similar fire-resistant materials. Please check the dates on your helmets now. There will NOT be loaner helmets available. If your helmet does not pass inspection, you will not drive.

To save time at the track, you may bring a completed Chicago region Tech sheet signed by a recognized Porsche dealer or mechanic. Be certain to pay close attention to the specifics concerning brake fluid and pads.

Every Blackhawk event is a sell out. Please pre-register (with payment) to ensure a spot in these events. Waiting lists will be used to fill open spots.

Thursday is for experienced Blackhawk drivers only!

Friday is for novices, women, and instructors only! Novices will be divided into groups for classroom sessions, track observation sessions at various turns, and ontrack sessions with instructors. The groups will alternate between the classroom, observation and critique of other driving groups, and in-car instruction. This day is planned as a low-key driving education experience for first time drivers. Instructors* will be assigned to each novice.

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

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Road America I Drivers' Education

May 26-28, 2000

We're pleased to announce the Chicago Region's first event of the new century at historic Road America in Elkhart Lake, Wisconsin. This will be the first of our two events at Road America this year, which is open to all Porsche drivers including novices. If you are a novice, we strongly suggest that you attend the Spring Drivers' School on April 30th as well as the Drivers' School at Blackhawk Farms Raceway on May 19th before participating in this event.

Road America is made up of fourteen turns, three long straights, and four total miles of winding track through the Kettle Moraine area of central Wisconsin making it one of the most scenic and exciting racetracks in North America. Our format this year is slightly different than in years past as we were able to add a third day to the schedule. The first day of the event, Friday, May 26th, will be open EXCLUSIVELY to Novice drivers and Instructors allowing us to offer a very high level of instruction for up to 50 novices. If you are a novice driver and want to participate in this event, please send in your registration today as this event is traditionally a sell out!

All novice drivers will receive classroom instruction provided by the Skip Barber team on Friday, along with controlled car handling exercises. Each novice will be assigned a PCA Instructor for the event who will help guide you safely through the weekend and help you to improve your driving skills. All novice drivers will also be required to attend a Novice Orientation Meeting on Thursday evening, May 25th at Siebkens at 8:00 PM.

There will be four run groups on Saturday and Sunday. Group 1 - our most experienced drivers with usually, but not always, the fastest cars; Groups 2 & 3 our next most experienced drivers who are somewhat slower than Group 1; and Group 4 - our novice drivers and others who are still fairly new to Road America.

Using the Chicago Region Tech Sheet (found in this issue of the Chicago Scene), it is your responsibility to thoroughly check your car yourself, or better yet, have it checked by a competent mechanic prior to the event. Be sure to pay close attention to the specifics detailed on the tech sheet concerning brake fluid and brake pads.

For Groups 1, 2, and 3, a five or six point harness is mandatory for the driver, and if you wish to have an instructor ride with you, the same type of harness is required on the passenger's side. Mandatory clothing for this event include: a SNELL approved SA 1995 helmet, long sleeve cotton shirt, long pants, socks, all

made of non-synthetic material, and closed toe shoes. Recommended, but not mandatory are driver's suits, driving gloves and shoes, and a protective neck brace all made of Nomex or similar fire-resistant materials and a mounted fire extinguisher. Please check the date on your helmet NOW, as it will be checked at tech inspection. Remember that if you do not pass tech inspection, you will not be permitted to drive.

The registrar will assign car numbers prior to the event and All cars must display those numbers on each side of the car and on the front hood. Numbers must be at least 6" tall on the sides and at least 8" tall on the hood. Shoe polish is not acceptable! If the corner workers cannot read your numbers, you will be black-flagged and will not be allowed out again until the deficiency is corrected. Once you have received your number assignment from the registrar, we recommend that you find a local sign shop that can create inexpensive static cling numbers.

All cars participating in this event must not exceed the Road America noise restriction of 108 dB. Please ensure that your car is in compliance with this limit. There are residential areas near the track, and Road America personnel will be monitoring our cars throughout the weekend. Included in your packets will be a copy of the Rules of Road America. Please take a few moments to read them before the start of the weekend so you can ensure that you the driver, your family, crew, and friends will comply with these rules. These rules are the landlord's, not ours. So, please help us comply.

In addition to the mandatory Novice Orientation Meeting on Thursday evening, there will be a Mandatory Drivers' Meeting on Friday for Novices and Instructors, and Saturday & Sunday mornings for ALL drivers to be held at the track at 7:45 AM sharp. Any driver who misses any of these meetings that address safety issues and policy for the weekend will not be allowed to drive.

Speaking of safety, as part of the registration form this year we are asking all participants to provide some personal medical information. We, as a Region, are taking a proactive approach to your personal well-being and this information will be provided to the track physician in the remote possibility it is needed.

Spaces for the event are limited, so we highly recommend that you pre-register early! Prior to April 1st, we will only accept pre-registrations from Chicago Region members. After that date pre-registration will be opened

to all Porsche drivers on a first-come, first-served basis. You will be notified of your acceptance by mail by the registrar. Now would also be an excellent time to call one of the listed hotels for weekend accommodations. Being a holiday weekend, they tend to book quickly. Please note that we do have a block of rooms reserved for the Porsche Club at the Osthoff.

Track registration for Novices and Instructors will be open at Siebkens on Thursday, May 25th from 4:00 - 7:00 PM. Registration for all other drivers will be at the Registration building at Road America from 4:00 - 7:00 PM on Friday, May 26th. Please remember that you must present a valid driver's license and your PCA membership card at registration. The tech crew will also be on hand to scrutinize your car and your helmet. If your car is not teched on Thursday or Friday afternoon, it must be teched at the track in the morning following the drivers' meeting. No car will be allowed to run without a tech approval sticker.

Siebkens will be the headquarters for the Thursday registration and the Novice Orientation Meeting. In addition to lodging, they also offer continental breakfast starting at 6:00 AM and a full service breakfast starting at 9:00 AM. Siebkens will also be on hand during Thursday evening's registration to sell tickets to a dinner that will be available in their dining room on Saturday evening after the track closes.

New this year, Road America is offering golf cart rentals to our participants. If you are interested, please make your reservations at least four weeks prior to the event. Please note that you will be responsible for any damage to the cart and Road America requires a minimum age of 16 to operate the golf carts.

The Registrar has established a 24-hour Registration Information line at 847.604.4795. If you have any questions, please feel free to call any of the Road America Memorial Day Weekend committee listed below between 6:00 PM and 9:00 PM CST.

We think you will find this Road America event to be one of the best track events of the year and hope to see you there!
