

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Looking Back - Looking Forward

Happy New Year! I hope you all had a wonderful holiday season and are ready for another year of Porsche fun. As your new president, I want to thank you for your trust and support, and I look forward to serving you and the Club in 2024.

I purchased my first Porsche, a 2002 Turbo with a factory Aerokit, right after Thanksgiving in 2008. After driving it on the Edens Expressway, I realized either I needed to learn how to drive this car or something truly bad was going to happen. I did some research and joined the Club in February of 2009. I attended the Autocross School in April (back then it was at Hawthorn Race Track) and then went to Novice Day at Blackhawk Farms (on Wednesdays, which is another story) and was hooked.



Flash forward; now I do more than twenty track days a season, teach the Drivers Ed and Autocross classrooms, re-did the Club's website, was involved in many areas of the Club, and now I find myself as President. It can truly be a slippery slope...

Before looking to the future, I'd like to thank Stanley Sangdahl, the outgoing president, for whom I've had the pleasure serving as his Vice President for the past two years. Stanley did a great job ensuring all our members are aware of what events are coming up and fostering an environment where we can explore new types of events.

Some of the highlights of the past year are:

- We crossed the threshold of 4000 members in the fall.
- We held 47 events with around 1300 members attending (up from 42 with around 1150 attending in 2022).
- We held our first ladies only drivers education event, introducing the fun of driving your Porsche on the track to 32 new drivers, and in the process, raised more than \$3400 for our charity.
- We raised \$35,000 for our charitable community partner Mobile Makers.

I am making the focus of 2024 increasing the engagement of our membership as both attendees and volunteers. To that end, we once again will be holding events that we have never done before or in ways that are different than in the past:

- The General Membership Meeting in January is moving to allow for greater attendance and we are using a format to encourage mingling and learning about all the areas of the Club.
- Street Survival, a defensive driving school for drivers 15½ to 20 will be held in April.
- We will be driving the full track at Autobahn twice.
- For the first time, we will hold two Porsche and Pastries on the same day in different parts of the Chicago area.

In addition, for the first time in our history, we have 50 events on our schedule and expect more to be added. Finally, this year's charitable community partner is CASA of McHenry County (https://www.casamchenrycounty.org/). Let's build on the what we did in 2023 and increase what we raise for the sixth year in a row.

A little history:

- Toys for Tots was founded 75 years ago, and this was the Chicago Region's 20th year of collections.
- Toys for Tots has distributed 652M toys to 291M kids.
- Chicago Region has collected over 12,000 toys and donated \$55,000.

Toys have a long-lasting impact on kids — we all remember our favorites. How many of you still collect certain "toys"? As kids, some members were even recipients of Toys for Tots due to circumstances beyond their control.



THANK YOU to those who contributed these last 20 years. And thank you to the Chicago Region Board and the PCA National Office for the respective \$1,000 and \$750 donations to supplement the toys. Because of your generosity, you made a child smile at an experience they will always remember.

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
The Concours Lawn: from an interview with Pat Yanahan

What follows are excerpts from an interview with Pat Yanahan, November, 2023.

Kirk, I've been a member of PCA-Chicago since 1975, but one thing I've learned over the years is that every season brings fresh challenges, new joys, recognition of my good fortune in getting to participate in this amazing sport, as well as working together and sharing with so many wonderful people.¹



I'll begin with a precaution: having worked in the advertising industry for over 30 years, I would advise you *not* to believe everything you see or read. The technology in car care and maintenance products has advanced immensely in the last several decades, but it goes in phases and fads. The term "ceramic," for example, is one of the current buzzwords, but it's not necessarily the best solution for every cleaning, maintenance, or preservation challenge...sometimes is just "marketing."

For me, each Spring brings a full weekend of work, which I approach in phases. When washing my car, I start with Dawn dish soap to safely remove all of the old wax & polish. Next, I'll use a clay compound, which gently picks up all of the

microscopic surface particles, etc. Finally, I'll apply a wax to the car's painted surfaces, to enhance and protect. After the exterior has been completed, I then work (in order) on the interior, then the engine and finally storage areas. If you have a new car, do not assume it's clean - as amazing as these cares are, Porsches get dirty, dusty, and scratched in transit.

One of my favorite cleaning products is Wurth Citrus Degreaser, which can be used to safely remove grease and dirt without affecting the paint or clear-coat. For fine scratch removal or polishing, I've found

Meguiar's DA Correction Compound to be excellent. (NOTES from Kirk – this is a single-stage paint correction done with dualaction buffer. Pat oversaw my paint correction - knocked-out 90% of the swirl marks and completely changed the Guards Red! Short of an exterior color change or adding a wing, this may be the most striking exterior enhancement you can do.) I have my favorite products but, I try to use a single brand since the products are formulated to work as a system. Don't be scared – ask others, read reviews, try on another car first and enjoy.

What's the most difficult area to clean on my 2014 Boxster? The engine! The newer 911s are also almost impossible to get into all of the little cavities. As a Concours judge, the areas many contestants often overlook are under the oil filler or brake fluid cans; and the inner surface of the door handles. When you prepare a car, you get so close to it you miss the obvious.

Whatever you do, don't go the Concours route alone. My wife Bonnie is my quality control inspector and inevitably sees things I've missed. Always have someone else inspect your work.





Let's not move too quickly beyond the obvious: making a car Concours podium ready, whether locally or at Parade, requires more than a microfiber towel and a strong elbow. Don't try to do everything in one day. Even getting ready for a local show can take 20 to 40 hours. In addition, never shy away from seeking advice. Always ask other competitors what they do and what are their favorite techniques. Above all, make it fun.

When asking Pat for technique recommendations, he responded: "There are books written on Concours preparation and competition, but relax and have fun. Anything can be restored or fixed, including well-worn leather and carpeting. Each author or participant has her or his favorite techniques and will share with you. Also, ask different owners who have excelled in Concours and they will gladly share."

In closing, take pride in owning a Porsche, and participating in Concours accomplishes at least three things: participation in an enjoyable sport; meeting new friends; and helping retain the value of these special cars. "My fun is in sharing what I've learned by passing it on."


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
