- Our General Member meeting on January 19th will once again feature informational "booths" from all the areas of the Club and is a perfect opportunity for members to learn about everything the Club has to offer.

While our entire 2025 schedule is on our website, we are working on planning other events based on ideas that hundreds of you provided in your responses to our activity planning survey in November. Keep checking as events are added we always keep the site is up to date.



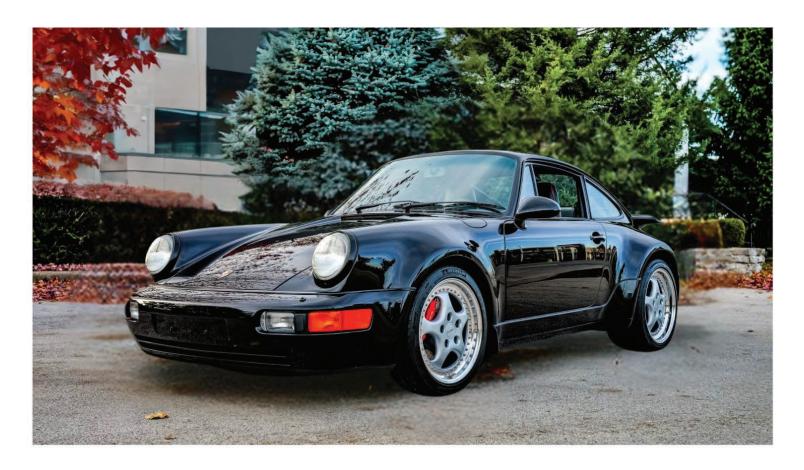

After people looked around and socialized for a while, Adam started his discussion and demonstration of their Vapor Hone Restoration process. It was very impressive to see how this process can really clean up engine parts and get them looking as good as new. He also explained the process of dry ice blasting to restore chassis parts to factory look; both processes are offered in-house. Next, Adam discussed wheel and tire care and maintenance. The age of tires and when they should be replaced was reviewed; most modern tires have a manufactured date on them. This code is a four digit number







with the first two digits being the production week, and second two numbers are the year. Therefore a (4818) build date code would be the 48th week of the year 2018... Tires over 5 years old for track use

should be replaced. Adam also spoke about tire technology and the rapid pace of development, tires from only a few years ago can be very different from new ones. There were lots of questions about winter and race tires and how they should be stored when not in use or during freezing temperatures. The suggestion

> is to review the manufacturer's recommendations for storage temps and pressures.

There was a raffle for some HPDE track days, along with





some merchandise from Euroquipe. When Adam was done, lunch was served, brought in from Just Kabobs - excellent Greek food (many took home leftovers) while sitting around tables in the shop, talking cars, and enjoying each other's company. Once again, it's the people that made the event so special, not necessarily the cars. A huge thanks to Adam and his staff for hosting us for a great Fall Tech event. 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

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The Concours Lawn: An Interview with John Moore

Is it a 20 year PCA membership or 12 years of Concours completion or lovingly owning four different (very) different P-cars that spotlight John Moore on The Concours Lawn? Yes, AND 1) being a wealth of knowledge, AND 2) continually selflessly sharing his wisdom with so many, AND 3) taking the reins this year as Concours Chairman, AND 4) being a terrific person and wonderful ambassador of our Club!

You might think being an Overall Concours Regional Champion (Grand Touring Class, 2021) would mean everything starts with the car - his 1971 911E Targa topped the podium four times AND was named Best of Show at Elkhart Lake AND continues winning events today - AND you'd be mistaken. For John, everything starts with family, the 911E will be passed to his children (Matthew & Rachel) AND was bought new by his father Henry.



Taking ownership in 2005, the 1971 911E Targa 2.2-litre flat-six Bosch mechanical fuel injection engine has 155 hp, with a top speed of 137 mph is geared to a five-speed manual 901 transmission. One with Tangerine & Black leatherette interior is difficult to find as it's one of only 935 built in 1971. A single-family owned car, it was purchased by John's father (Henry Moore) at O'Hare Porsche Audi and delivered to him at the factory in Stuttgart. Henry Moore vacationed in Germany and Switzerland - breaking in the new Targa before shipping it back to America.

As Henry would want, John drives the car year-round(!) (weather permitting) and washes it monthly. Bringing a 53 year old longhood to Concours requires a one-track mindset – as John puts it, "My approach to Concours preparation is to "GO ALL IN" and accept the challenge of competition against beautiful and well maintained Porsches." Stern discipline from a guy living in a condo – John loads a grocery cart with a vacuum and a trove of Griot's, Chemical Guys, Esoteric, McGuire's, Simple Green, Turtle Wax, WURTH, LEXOL Leather, distilled water & white vinegar mix and 303 products to his parking space for the 7 – 10 days of concours preparation. Because John "actually likes detailing the car" – he's built a "discipline of controlled order in doing the detailing work."

John competes at the highest concours level - Grand Touring (exterior, interior, storage & engine). "First is the engine, starting at the top and working down." With attention to the underside of the decklid, the hinges latch and panels is critical because dirt collects there. Champion-level from requires champion-level tools = microfiber pads, towels, chopsticks, small picks as well as brass & fiber brushes. John added, "I can spend the whole day cleaning a fairly clean engine; I'm looking for that BLING finish that pops."


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


John's experience allows us to learn from his recommendations. "Develop the discipline of order and detail your car in that manner. Detail the car in stages over a period of time...don't jump around. Work in good lighting and use good comfortable set of knee pads." Never far from his judge's eye, he shares what's often missed (and deducted from a perfect score) - "Glass and gauges, the steering wheel column, seat rails, latches, hinges, seals, mirrors, lug nuts, door pockets, glove box and roof liner." No small list ... hence 7-10 days!

Although you won't see John's previously-owned Porsches (1962 356B 1600 Super 90 or a 1977 911S), you WILL see this year his 1987 911 Carrera 3.2 litre G50 coupe in Diamond Blue Metallic over Burgundy, purchased in 2019. In addition to participating and judging, John serves as Concours Chair and offers these words to encourage new participants, "Go to Concours School to get a clear understanding of what professional detailing is all about. Participate in Show and Shine events where you can learn from others. Review the score sheets of the different classes as they describe what areas are judged. Always review your score sheets after an event - the notes and deductions point out areas to make improvements."

Mr. Chairman "...will always remember the 2021 Concours season - winning Overall First Place in Grand Touring with the 911E Targa had a special "single-family car achievement" for Matthew and Rachel, my son and daughter who will continue the legacy." He goes on to add, "Across many ways of interacting with







great people, I have learned more about my car and how to keep it in top Concours condition; Concours has improved the value of my car. My addiction to detailing has helped me enjoy the car and at the same time develop relationships with member volunteers of PCA-Chicago Region." And if you need a little more inspiration to concours your Porsche, use these words of title-winning inspiration, "Showing up for a Concours event and having a stranger or competitor compliment my car is a tremendous rush. I know then





that the work was worth it and it could be a great day. There is no better feeling than being the last person walking up to get your Concours event award. That's because you are the First Place winner!" ■

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Ok, so the car is just for attention, but if you're looking for a home that's as special as your Porsche, let's talk. 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40 Years of Eurosport: An Interview with Brian Weathered

Brian Weathered was born in LaGrange, IL and, as the youngest of five kids, he was often unsupervised. Brian recalls, "everything in the house I took apart, including the TV set." His mother gave his older brother, George, and him free reign over a two-car garage in which, "we built everything with a motor on it." For instance, they once created a snowmobile using a sled on two skis with a saw blade on the back to propel it.

"My grandfather had a farm, so we used to go there on the weekends where we had minibikes, dirt bikes and go carts; everything with motors. We were always building stuff." His early interest was drag racing because George was building race engines. Jobs in his youth quickly influenced the direction his life would take.

At 14 he took a mostly unpaid position working at a body shop, sanding and doing odd jobs. "I think I earned \$50 for the whole year." At 16 he got his license and took a job as a porter with Jack Douglas Chevrolet Hinsdale, IL. George had a job there as Assistant Service Manager and it is where the brothers were first exposed to road racing.

The dealership sponsored Brian Redman's Formula 5000 car with Carl Haas. The race team stopped at the dealership to prep the car for Road America. The transporter pulled up and a couple of English guys asked Brian to give them a hand. He spent three days helping prep the car which landed him an invite to go to the track. As the race was about to begin he asked where the best place was to watch...Corner 1. Brian ran all the way to the corner and watched from the snow fence which, in 1974, was basically right on the track. When the race started and the cars came through the corner he thought "wow! This is super cool." He was hooked.

The brothers left the dealer and went to a company that was representing AMG when they were still a privately owned, small (\sim 8000 sq/ ft) town tuner shop in Germany. The company, which wanted to get involved with Mercedes, asked Brian to go to Germany for a two-week training.

In Germany the owners asked him to stay the entire summer. Brian was given a ticket to attend the German Grand Prix. At the

tender age of 21 "I felt like a rock star when I got in with paddock passes. Back then you'd see AMGs on Miami Vice. They were really cool, rare cars." That summer gave him an appreciation for German cars.

Brian and George became interested in

converting gray market cars from overseas. They started working for a guy who was importing a lot of 911 Turbos. You couldn't get them in the states. This began their love of Porsche.


In 1984 the brothers opened their own shop, Midwest Eurosport, in Elk Grove Village, IL. Five years later they bought the old Long Ford building, in Bensenville.


In 1985 Brian started road racing. This was before PCA had Club Racing, but they would bring cars and drivers up to Road America for vintage racing. "When PCA Club Racing started we were all in. We bought a transporter and started hauling customer's cars. We were at the first PCA Road America and we oversaw tech."

He met his wife, Karyn, had two kids and took a break from racing (but not from the track). With his family in tow, he traveled the country to support his clients (better known as friends) at PCA races. At 52 years old, with his wife's encouragement and their kids in high school, he began racing his own 944S2 Today he runs Tim McKenzie's 1974 #69 yellow and black 914, well known in the Club Racing community. Brian started working on Tim's car in 2000. "He became not only a great racer but a great mentor for everyone on my team. He would sit down with drivers and coach them. He was thought of as the best driver in PCA." Tim did some pro racing with us and Kelly Moss, but he always came back and drove the 914. Tim would always say, "I'll never sell this car. I love it too much." Unfortunately, Tim was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and passed away in 2013. At the memorial service Tim's wife, Marianne, asked Brian to sell the car for her, but Brian wasn't ready. He didn't want to crew the car for anybody else. Racing with Eurosport was such a big part of Tim's life that the Eurosport team hauled Tim's beloved car to the memorial service and rolled it right into the Monona Terrace auditorium. After the ceremony a bagpiper played nearby while attendees queued past the car to

touch Tim's helmet. That day, Brian sat next to Tim's college roommate, Gary Bymers. They bonded over Tim stories and quickly became friends. Marianne eventually gave Gary the 914, saying that is what Tim would have wanted. Gary brought the car to the track and Brian began coaching him. During those track days, Gary fell in love with Brian's short wheelbase 911... And Brian coveted the 914, so they traded. "So, it turned out that the 914 never got sold. It came back to me. I pinch myself every time I drive it." It's one of the oldest cars at the track and it's still competing with many of the newer cars. Today, nearly 40 years later Eurosport Racing supports customers at 12-15 races annually. "My whole business plan is wrapped around Porsche Club Racing and Porsche service. I run the original facility. 20 years ago we put a satellite shop at Autobahn Country Club in Joliet, IL which my brother George runs. Originally, we thought we would just be there on the weekends, but that boomed into a whole separate business that supports 500 club members." Half of the Bensenville business is Porsche street car work and supporting Driver's Ed folks. The other half is race cars. Brian's Porsche clients aren't just customers, they're his close friends. "My attorney, my banker, my doctor, we all race together on the weekends and are a really tight group. That's the way it is with these guys. That's the way with all

these racers. If I'm ever in a jam or need advice, they are all great people." In interviewing Brian, Skip commented "This is the most family-friendly compound at this event" Brian replied, "thank you. We try to make it that way. We have all the kids up here. You know, that's memories." Just as his wife, Karyn, and now grown children spent summers under the racing tent, a new generation of families are growing up on the track. Today, as always, Brian's work and hobbies are one and the same. He loves to collect things and has a huge car collection. The problem, he says, "is I buy stuff, but I never sell it." He has an old 1937 Chevy pick-up that was a farm truck at the Joliet prison farm that he restored with a turbocharged 5-cylinder inline diesel engine. He also collects 911s. At almost the 40 year anniversary since founding Eurosport Racing, Brian can't help but feel sentimental. "Overall, it's been a great ride and I'm having the time of my life. I get up every morning and I look forward to going to the shop."








Cover Shots - Runners-Up
