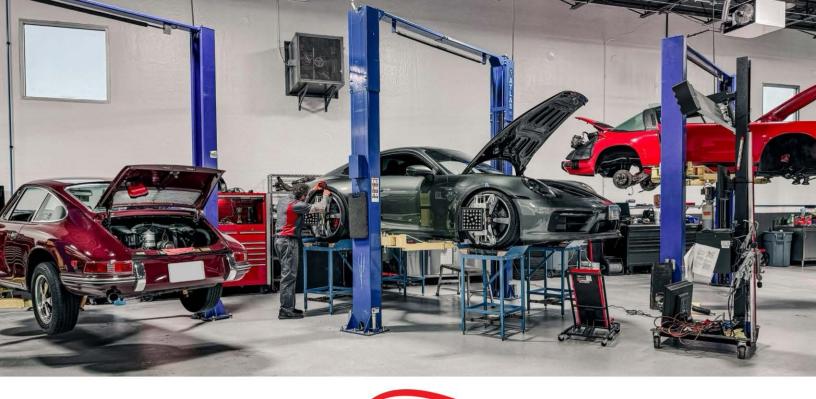

Each year we conduct a Concours school in March before our competitive Concours season begins in conjunction with Show n' Shine. The end of March signals spring and the time when hibernated Porsches escape their dormant state. This is the time for that first cleaning of your Porsche.

Members and guests attend Concours School to pick up on car care tips, new car care product technology, and application techniques.

This year the Concours school was held on March 23rd at Napleton Porsche in Westmont. The Concours team was put to the test; hands-on demonstrations encompassed the main Napleton showroom as well as two other stations in the mechanic's shop.

We had a tremendous turnout for the event with former attendees and first timers to the school. Future Q-Tippers (AKA car cleaners and detailers) turned out for the car care seminar. The group of 90 people involved in car care included 80 attendees and ten Concours judges available to help answer questions of the attendees. Additionally, we had two guest



speakers both of whom are expert professionals in their field to enhance our program.

Michael Schultz, Senior Vice President of Research and Development at Turtle Wax discussed and demonstrated new product technology in Pro Grade exterior repair and exterior finishing. We all are aware of the many brands of car care products on the market today and the confusion in selecting the right product to use on your car. Michael, a chemical engineer, provided insight through his hands-on demonstrations on how to properly clean, repair and polish the paint with a quality chemical solids formula product.

Mike Luurs, owner of Luurs Hot Rod Shop in Romeoville and Sam Mak, Napleton discussed with each of the three groups, "What It Takes to Win a National Contest." This station was to showcase a 2013 997 4S Speed Yellow coupe for the Napleton Porsche restoration project. Mike Luurs and Fred Mayer of Luurs Hot Rod Shop did body work and painted the car. For example, each year Porsche dealerships compete with a classic car that is rebuilt and restored with Porsche classic parts. The dealership works on the car for several months and the competition is judged in August.

Their focus for the preservation and preparation program event was essential in ensuring proper care to preserve the beauty and value of your car. Our national award winning Concours judges participated in the event by helping to guide the three equal groups of attendees to the three different work stations.



Pat Yanahan and John Moore planned three separate work stations which would allow three groups to rotate through three different 40-minute sessions.

Station A was Michael Schultz, a chemical engineer who brought sample product and materials to demonstrate how to prep and restore and repair the paint finish on the exterior using new product technology.

Station B was Ron Bean, a judge and National winner, demonstrating those forgotten wheels and the correct products and application to make them Concours perfect. John Diwik, another judge and National Concours winner, demonstrated the interior cleaning of the car and proper cleaning of all auto glass.

Station C was Mike Luurs of Luurs Hot Rod Shop and Sam Mak of Napleton, who discussed and presented what it takes to rebuild that 2013 997 4S and do a total restoration on a classic Porsche.

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We always want to thank our event host Napleton Porsche Westmont for providing a beautiful venue for our 2025 Concours School event. Blake Thompson and his team did a fantastic job providing coffee and pancakes as well as helping our Concours Team to deliver a great program to our PCA members and guests.

I also would like to thank our PCA Concours Team and speakers: Pat Yanahan, Michael Grove, Henrique Regina, Barb Mashburn, Jim Dorfman, Ron Bean, and John Diwik. This group made the Concours School event a success at every level.

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y boyfriend, Phil, has been suggesting I attend the PCA-C autocross school since last year. Phil has been autocrossing Porsches for years, and suggested I give it a try. He gave me a helmet for my birthday, so I took a deep breath and signed up!

The day is laid out well. We would start with classroom instruction on three techniques or elements, then break for some hands-on experience. After this, we would head back to the classroom, cover a few important pointers, and head out for a second try at the three elements. Then, the organizers would put the elements together, so that we could experience a full autocross.

Classroom

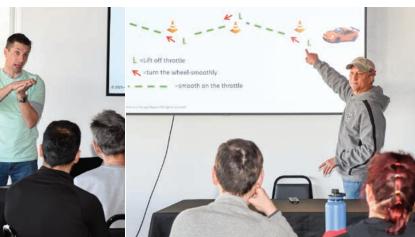
In the classroom, Dana and Larry covered very important elements needed for autocross: cornering, braking, safety. They used lots of visuals to reinforce their instruction. They were very thorough and answered all of the classroom's questions. After the classroom, it was time to head back outside, get in the car, and practice!





The skid pad is designed to test cornering and grip of the car. You drive around a circle of cones, staying as close to the cones as possible while ramping up your speed. If you're not careful, you'll push past the "limit of adhesion." In the morning, I didn't come close to the limit of adhesion. Our friend Noel, an instructor at the skid pad, encouraged me to drive faster. I did get faster as the day went on. Just try not to get dizzy!







Element 2: Braking Zone

The braking zone is pretty simple: accelerate as fast as possible, then brake as hard as possible, and don't hit the wall of orange cones set up at the end of the element. Your goal is to get as close to those cones as possible, without hitting them. There were markers labeled 3, 2, and 1 to help gauge where to start braking. Phil was an instructor in the braking zone, and hopped in to give me instruction on my first run. "Floor it off the line, brake hard at marker 3, and don't hit the cones." I did floor it, but I started braking way earlier than marker 3, and I stopped way too early. Practice makes perfect, a few more tries, and I was getting better. It's remarkable what these cars are capable of.





The slalom is designed for drivers to weave through a series of cones. Bill instructed me well in this element. I understood the purpose of the element, but Bill helped bring it to life. "Turn!" He told me when to turn as I weaved through those cones. It was helpful. I needed to turn earlier than I thought. I got better at the slalom as we practiced more.

After lunch and a brief visit to the classroom, we were back at it. Skid pad, braking zone, slalom. The second time around I could tell I had improved versus the morning session.



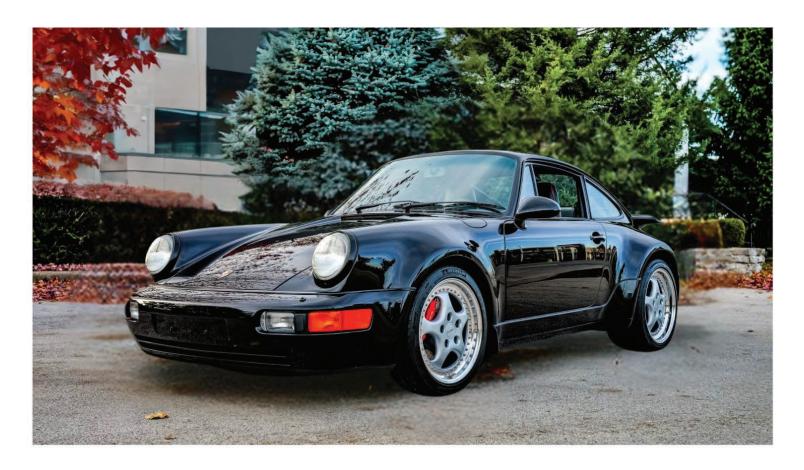

Then it was time for the full autocross. Phil got in the car to help instruct me through the full autocross. The full autocross was a full course that simply linked the three elements we had practiced. The starter said go, and we were off! It was an adrenaline rush. A series of cones directed drivers where to go. The course comes at you fast. "You missed a couple of cones back there." "I did?"

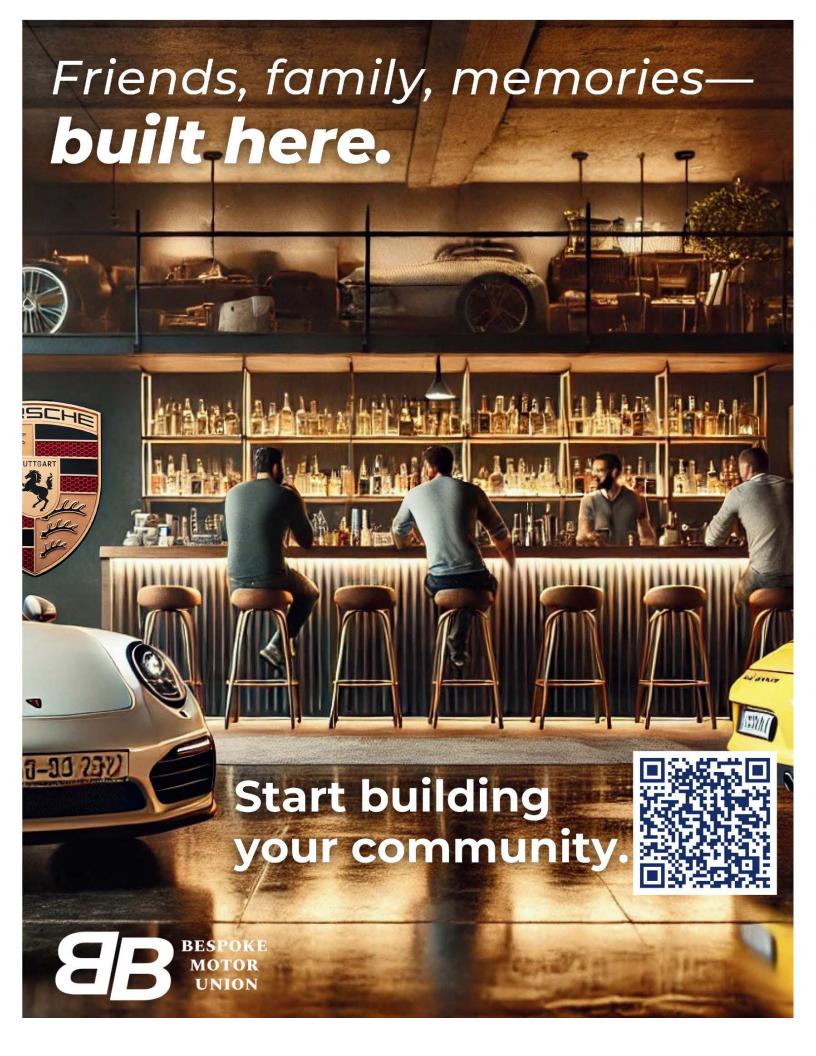
My second run was cleaner. I was able to successfully navigate the cones, minus one section. I corrected that in my third run, and got faster. My fourth and final run was my fastest, and my cleanest! What a rush.

After a few years of driving my 911 around tracks

across the Midwest, I decided it was time to give back to the community that taught me how to hit apexes and trail brake properly. So when the PCA-Chicago Region offered a one-day instructor training course, I jumped at the chance. I mean, how hard could it be? As it turns out, sitting in the passenger seat while someone else drives like a caffeinated teenager with a learner's permit is an entirely new kind of adrenaline.

The day was split between classroom sessions and on-track roleplay with current instructors pretending to be students. There



were four in-car sessions, each representing different experience levels, and each one more humbling than the last.

In the first session, my "student" had never been on track before and wanted to learn how to drive his car on the limit, which, of course, was a 2019 GT3 RS... It was rigorous, humbling, and one of the most fun days I've had at the track. I left with a deeper appreciation for my own instructors and the anxiety I'm sure I caused them in the early days. I can't wait to pay it forward and help the next generation find their line.

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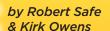

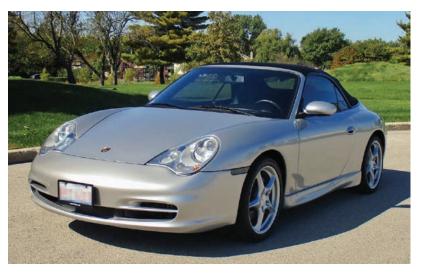


The Concours Lawn:

An Interview with Henrique Regina

"I like to have clean cars. I can't stand to see dirty cars, especially Porches." When that's your attitude, it's no wonder an 11-year PCA membership, and 11-year Concours participation streak, backbone your experience and microfiber love of PCA-Chicago. Henrique Regina has owned, and concoursed, three VERY different Porsches - 2002 911 Carrera 4 cabriolet, 2013 Panamera GTS, 2008 Cayenne GTS – and discovered the Fountain of Youth for each, "Concours is a way to preserve your car for the long run. Keeping it clean not only looks good but also helps maintain the paint and the rubber/ plastic trim looking new for decades." Proof positive – the 911 AND the Cayenne took First Place in Full Concours class. Never too far out of mind are Henrique's humble Concours roots, "My very first Concours (2013 at The Promenade in Bolingbrook), I was just starting and didn't really know what I was doing. I came in 4th place in Exhibition class (exterior only) ... it was great and I felt I could do well. Everyone was helpful and encouraging. Initially it felt intimidating but after attending the first event it became a challenge."



Currently holding keys for the cabriolet and the Panamera, Henrique uses various products (Meguiar's, Griot's, Chemical Guys, Cerakote, Turtle Wax and Koch Chemie) and is, "... always trying new things to see how well they work." He notes, the chassis is usually the most difficult to clean, "especially without a lift" but his "Cayenne had an air suspension so raising it to max height made it easy to get under the car to clean." Even though a full wash doesn't always happen - "I don't use the 911 very often, it gets cleaned after every use but rarely washed. The

Panamera also isn't used daily but it does get washed typically every couple weeks or so." he happily shares a important insider tips:

1) Getting the car to "Concours level" is the hardest, especially if you are starting with a car that hasn't been detailed most of its life. But once you get it to Concours level and then gets used/dirty, it's important to not let it accumulate ... clean it as soon as possible and





the process will take only minutes and will require less work. Maintaining a car clean is much easier this way.

2) Check and clean the cracks in the front seat, next to the bolsters, you will always find something there. Even when you think you cleaned it well some piece of whatever always ends up visible to the judge.

Having served as a Concours judge, and having guided this group, Henrique is active locally and nationally, "In 2024, I mostly judged did enter my 911 at the Elkhart Lake event, taking First Place in the Street class (exterior and interior); I also judged at Parade in Birmingham. 2025

has the same and I plan to judge at Parade again in Oklahoma City." Not shy about his participation, Henrique's knowledge-base and garage space are front and center, "(PCA & Concours) Is a great group of people and I have learned a lot about Porsches at these events over the last 11 years. Not only how to keep them clean and in working order but also what to look for in my next purchase hopefully a air-cooled model will be in my garage next year." As you've seen at PCA Chicago event, the air-cooled contingent is (flat six) strong - he'll be in great company and we look forward to seeing his next "Concours challenge worthy" Porsche!
