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Street Survival: A Student's Perspective



hen my stepmother, a driver's ed instructor, signed my brother and me up for Tire Rack Street Survival, the 7 a.m. registration time, the lengthy schedule, and the distance from home were all deterrents. However, I knew she would take advantage of every opportunity to make us feel more comfortable behind the wheel, and this was no exception.

Upon arriving at Autobahn Country Club in Joliet, we were split into two groups and paired up with a







volunteer driving instructor. The groups alternated between indoor classroom sessions and outdoor driving practice. Participants were given a lunch break halfway through.

Inside, we were shown presentations and videos about responsible driving practices, such as how to avoid distracted driving and handle hydroplaning. Outside, we put this knowledge to the test by cycling through an obstacle course with four stations: the slalom


(weaving between a line of cones), the braking zone (braking a vehicle at high speeds), the skid pad

(making quick turns on a wet or dry surface), and an area where we could make several rapid lane changes, as if on a highway.

Miscellaneous activities throughout the day included checking our tire pressures and witnessing an airbag demonstration that launched a water bottle onto a nearby track. We also each got behind the wheel of a stationary semi-truck surrounded by cars positioned so that it was impossible to see them, even in the rearview mirror.

I found the course valuable for comprehending the capabilities and limitations of my vehicle. My driving instructor was always understanding about what I felt comfortable doing, and I was

gradually able to complete the obstacle course faster and with less disorientation. I'm grateful that this course increased my confidence behind the wheel, especially since driving requires lifelong learning and countless unexpected firsthand experiences. Buckle up!





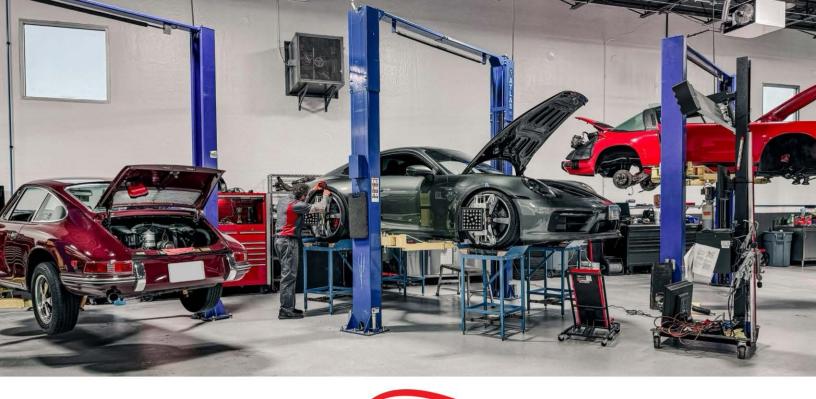

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

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
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A Higher Perspective: SUV AutoX at Tire Rack


were a bit reserved as we didn't know anyone from the host club. But everyone was very gracious and welcoming.


