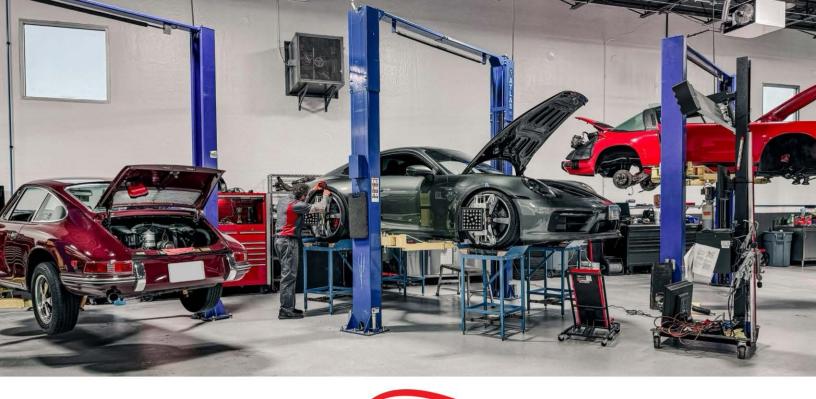


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Potter's Picnic




Concours d' Elegance in great fashion and recognized as such.

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The theme was summer heat, great backroads, a gracious Galena with an Irish "twist" and a good dose of Presidential history. PCA-Chicago's summer driving tour in July was to historic Galena, situated in the beautiful rolling hills of Midwest Illinois. Our history lesson for the tour was the Landmark house museum of our 18th President, Ulysses S. Grant, who led the Union Army during the Civil War. Grant lived in the home before and after his presidency and remains a big part of Galena's history. Galena is home to numerous 19th century residences and commercial buildings

located near its robust downtown Main Steet, the business center and major tourist attraction.

The tour started from Hampshire, Illinois, where roughly 40 Porsche vehicles gathered on a warm Friday morning. A variety of Germany's finest from earlier 911s to the latest version of the flagship 911 GTS, Carreras, a 911 50th anniversary along with many versions of Caymans, Boxsters, and Macans. Of note, were the matching Miami Blue Boxster and Macan owners

demonstrating their Porsche passion.
Leaving Hampshire the caravan headed northwest for the 2 hour drive to Galena, through the towns of Stockton and Elizabeth (always watch your speed...), with the planned stop at Chestnut Mountain Resort for our group lunch. Our resort dining venue provided scenic views of the rolling hills countryside and Mississippi River. The Chestnut Mountain Resort hosted a good family-oriented restaurant, many outdoor summer activities and in winter several ski slopes from its location high above the River.

Our final destination on Friday was the host hotel, Irish Cottages Inn just east of Galena on Rt. 20, to Experience the Charm of Ireland in the Heart of Galena. As the name implies its theme throughout is an authentic Irish experience from the style of the hotel to the in-house O'Dowd's Irish Pub and Grill and adjacent library which all makes for an interesting experience beyond what

one would normally find for a roadside hotel. Guestroom accommodations met expectations, food was authentic Irish and UK cuisine and Guiness was on tap at the pub as expected. The day's group social was held at the hotel on Friday evening which followed an open afternoon schedule for the 80 member participants to explore Galena and surroundings. Weekends can be very busy in Galena.

The evening social is a terrific opportunity to meet the many PCA-C members, guests and Porsche enthusiasts who participated and share stories of who you are and your definition of the Porsche lifestyle, which it certainly is. I even met a young man who felt his Cayman was therapeutic. This summer's driving event did not disappoint. Especially past tales from previous driving events I heard from our "vintage" members, and I use that term loosely. It's the attitude and love of all things Porsche that seems to bring out the youthful side for many of us, its transformative. I understand that there was a flat tire incident during the weekend trip which was safely taken care of thanks to the many lead and follow cars used during any driving event.

The big day in anticipation was the Saturday morning "spirited" drive onto the backroads of the Galena area planned by our tour coordinator and Herder of Cats, Mr. John Diwik. I consider John


Breakfast was provided by the host hotel

each morning in the Pub, after which we

proceeded on the Saturday tour toward the towns of Hanover and Savanna, starting along Blackjack Road and continuing onto State Rt 84. The two-lane route was beautiful with gently rolling hills, scenic overlooks toward the River, well manicured farms with fields of corn, the occasional grazing cattle and horses, and past sleepy country towns. We drove within the Palisades area of the Mississippi Valley near the Mississippi Palisades State Park













and past a beautiful suspension bridge over the mighty river. Upon returning to the hotel while stopped to re-fuel, one of the locals stepping out of his pickup walked over to me and actually complimented the cars and pronounced Porsche correctly. We always draw attention in a good way.

During the Saturday morning drive, the group was motoring along at a rather brisk pace, roads were smooth, we were all feeling good, as this is what the drive is all about and our pace continued for many miles without interruption. We suddenly slowed to a more civilized speed of 25-30 MPH -not knowing why. After the Saturday drive, most returned to the Inn to gather their

thoughts for what may be next. The afternoon was again open to explore Galena, have lunch, create your own scenic drive as many did or head into town and do the tourist thing. Having enjoyed the Galena area in the past, I headed to town to check things out and happy to see not much has changed over the years. Main Street Galena is a bustling scene and attracts many visitors during summer weekends. The local shops and businesses represent numerous choices from established restaurants, historic hotels, 19th century restored facades, antique and vintage shops, artist galleries and the usual souvenirs shops. For me, I did another high-speed drive along Blackjack Road.

For a change in scene while in the area; Check out the Eagle Ridge Territory, a planned community development that came about in the 80's featuring a resort complex, golfing, single family homes and house rentals in a tightly controlled architectural style and nicely landscaped surroundings, a nice change from bustling Galena.

The concluding event was the group dinner in the Blarney Stone Ballroom of the hotel on Saturday evening. The formal dinner featured the signature Midwest Buffet offering a wide choice of midwestern cuisine. Before serious socializing got underway, various Porsche related photos, artwork and books were raffled and a few lucky members had the winning tickets.

Sunday arrived way too soon and after breakfast many headed

east to their homebase. The day started foggy and overcast but lasted briefly. Once again it was a well-planned and fun driving weekend and an opportunity to meet with fellow members in a casual setting. Participants got to experience the passion and performance potential of these glorious cars which to me is a good, no great weekend, I think most would agree.





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Bridging Munich & Stuttgart: GingerMan 2025

As a way to bridge the gap between the two major German automakers, I reached out to Chris and asked few questions about his experience attending this year's GingerMan event. an environment that felt both professional and friendly.

As a BMW driver attending a PCA-C track day for the first time, I wasn't sure what to expect. Prior to the event, the tech inspection process felt a little daunting especially since I thought it required a third-party shop sign-off. I later learned that while an outside inspection is recommended, it's not mandatory, which helped ease that initial concern. Once at the track, the atmosphere felt very familiar just like any other track day I've attended. The group was welcoming, the organization was solid, and it was easy to settle in and enjoy the driving.

I was placed in Group 2, which ended up being a great fit. There were a few other BMWs in the run group, which made it feel a little more comfortable and familiar. Since it was my car's first time back at GingerMan in about two years, it took a couple of sessions to shake off the rust and get settled in. Once I found a rhythm, passing felt smooth and controlled, and at no point did I feel like there were any risky moments on track.

How about the social side of things?

The social side of the event was just as enjoyable as the track time. Having wine, beer, and dinner served was something totally new for me at a track day, and it was a nice touch that made the evening feel more like a community gathering than just a driving event. Conversations flowed easily, with plenty of laughs and goodnatured banter about who would be passing who the next day. As someone coming in as an outsider, I was genuinely impressed by how welcoming everyone was it made it easy to feel like part of the group right away.


Anything particularly unique compared to other organizations?

In terms of differences from other organizations, there really weren't many. Aside from that and the tech inspection before the event it felt very much like other track days I've attended. There was the same strong sense of community, friendliness, and shared passion for driving that makes these events so enjoyable.



When I had gone off track, they immediately checked in to make sure both myself and the car were okay (apologies again for taking away a bit of track time). I'm genuinely looking forward to coming back for more events in the future.







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If you own a 986, 987, 996 or 997, you are likely familiar with this problem: black foam spewing from the air conditioning vents that eventually stops and leads to "window fog".

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It was early 2025 when PCA-Chicago member Dan Cubric put on his farmer's hat and planted the seed of an idea that we assemble a Chicago group to attend the Goodwood Festival of Speed in England. GOOD Trip to Goodwood continued





Midweek had all of us heading south on the A3 for the outskirts of Chichester and the Goodwood Estate, an 11,000-acre property containing historic Goodwood House, the home of the Dukes of Richmond, and host of the Goodwood Festival of Speed and Goodwood Revival. The estate also includes a motor racing circuit, a racecourse, and a farm... something for everyone!

The Festival of Speed begins on Thursday and builds every day to its Sunday finish. With at least 20 separate events taking place each of the 4 days, it would take pages to describe it all, but some of the highlights for all auto enthusiasts were the daily supercar and hypercar hill climb runs and the flybys of incredible Formula 1 cars, from vintage front-engine racers to the iconic Tyrell P34 "six wheeler" Elf, to the modern Red Bull and Haas

screamers, and those were just running up the gentle Goodwood hill track. The Fest also featured several Forest Rally runs and special balcony interviews with motorsport legends Derek Bell and Alain Prost among others.

Goodwood's huge space allows for plentiful static displays of all major motorsport manufacturers, and the Porsche display was the

from Porsche Heritage Design, highlighting the Porsche Exclusive Manufaktur program and paying homage to the aesthetic of 1970's fashion and taste. The Porsche area was staffed with the most friendly and engaging representatives; they deserve a special mention for how enjoyable and accessible they made the brand offerings and interactions.

For me and my wife however, the highlight of the Festival was seeing the road legal Porsche 917 once owned by Teofilo Guiscardo Rossi di Montelera, AKA the "Count Rossi" 917. This full-fledged racecar was produced by the Weissach development center and adapted for road use by a small


team dedicated to fulfilling the wishes of top Porsche enthusiasts, and still wears its original paint as well as a very worn-in patina of chips, scratches, leather abrasions and other marks of character, evidence of its frequent use and spirited driving, something that every Porsche car deserves. Seeing this 917 in person and up close reaffirmed for me the ethos of the brand. Porsche is a driver's car, designed to be driven hard and often. We are only here for a passing moment, and these cars we love and appreciate are special rewards to be enjoyed to the utmost, shared and not squirreled away. Gazing upon that car was exhilarating.

If Goodwood sounds overwhelming in its scope, that would be because it is. It takes at least three of its four days to take in everything, and we found that taking one day off to tour other English countryside offerings was refreshing. One comment we heard repeatedly was that the upper 80-degree weather we were sweating under was the best conditions anyone can remember, as they often experience the English country rains that dampen portions of the event. As it happened, we had chosen to attend the 75th anniversary year of the F1 World Championship which made it extra special and brought out so many of the Formula 1 cars and several current and past drivers. It definitely pays to have good timing!

Not long ago, someone asked me: "What drew you to try Autocross, and what keeps you coming back?"

The first part was easy. Autocross gave me the chance to push my Porsche hard—legally—and to sharpen my car control in a setting where the worst outcome is a few flattened cones, not a ride home on a flatbed.

The second part of the question is trickier. The hook is the challenge itself. Each course is different, demanding precision, focus, and skill far more than raw horsepower. That chase for the perfect run—the split-second improvement, the adrenaline of shaving off just a tenth of a second—never gets old.

Then there's the competition. We're car enthusiasts; of course we like to compete. But here's the surprise: autocross is one of the most supportive communities I've ever experienced. Veterans are quick to share advice, whether it's during a course walk, from the passenger seat as you drive, or by inviting you to ride along with them. Everyone wants to see everyone else improve, and that camaraderie is remarkable.

And for me, there's one more reason. My son recently moved back to the area, and autocross has become *our thing*. In a world dominated by screen time, nothing beats the father-son rivalry of same car, same course, mano a mano. Sure, there's some goodhumored trash talk, but at the end of the day, we're building memories—ones I know we'll carry for a lifetime.

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The Concours Lawn: An Interview with Dave Mangano

The Boxster S Dave Mangano bought in 2009 has given him a love for Porsche, miles of open-top excitement and a mantra each of us should follow, "Everyone should have a plan for their Porsche - be it a daily driver, recreational driving or participating

in PCA events."

As a 16-year PCA member, he was stung by the Concours bug and that wound hasn't healed. In 2019 Dave entered all five concours events - finishing in either last place or 4th. As with many new to concours, it was "Hard to understand how I could not do better with such a great car and preparation. I wondered if it was the judges' fault." The 2020 shutdown brought perspective, cleaning and prep time as

well as a new microfiber commitment. In 2021, "I made the transition from being irritated, by getting dinged for deductions, to thanking the judges for pointing out deductions." As if the wax-on, wax-off gods were listening, Dave went on to finish overall 1st place (Show category = exterior, interior & storage) in both 2021 and 2022!

"I spend a lot of effort preparing my car because it's about perfection. It's also like art work transforming my Porsche from a car that looks good to a car that looks amazing." Those lessons in fine art came from Dave's mentors, and Grand Touring (exterior, interior, storage & engine/chassis) winners, John Moore and Don Janes. Applying those teachings has earned Dave multiple Grand Touring category wins, a HUGE accomplishment in a field of Parade champions!

An Interview with Dave Mangano

As any of us with a black Porsche knows, everything shows! It's a long process, many hours and lots of patience to achieve a mirror finish and Dave's found (thankfully sharing) his routine. It starts with a clay bar session to remove paint contamination, then an orbital polisher with a microfiber pad to apply Sonax, giving a perfect finish polish. After polishing he applies Turtle Wax Ceramic Graphene Paste Wax for paint depth and protection. WINNER'S TIP: a polish/wax residue will remain, it's very important to remove all residue. Dave's final step is applying small amount of window cleaner to remove any remaining residue. Just when you think that's all, "Because I have a black car, I can't wash the car with water because it leaves water spots everywhere so I apply graphene paste wax every quarter - including rims and wheel liners." For the cabriolet top, he uses Porsche convertible top conditioner and overall, prefers Turtle Wax products.

Winner's Circle advice for new concours entrants, "Porsches are increasing in value - the time and cosmetic investment can be a good ROI. I've increased the value of my car well over 50% by DIY paint improvement or restoration and cosmetic improvements. Judges will coach you one-on-one how to improve your score." To keep that shine

between events, "It's important to cover your car, this will keep the dirt and scratches from your car."

"Within Concours, some compete to win, some join for the camaraderie and for others it's an extension of cleaning your car or enjoying the membership. The point is having fun, talking about Porsches and reaching your car's potential." From tail pipe cleaning to lint in the glove box, Dave's knowledge and love extends to judging events as well. In his second year as a judge, the most common mistake he notes is, "Entrants spending too much time on the outside and not enough time in the interior and windows. Commonly overlooked are hinges, latches and seat rails." Advice from the top of the podium, "No short cuts and don't take anything for granted." Concours participation has helped Dave maintain his beautiful 2000 Boxster S, he's "learned from well-informed Porsche colleagues everything

from preparation to repair."

Returning to Dave's mantra his Porsche plan -"Try to win first place in (our region's) Grand Touring, compete at Porsche Parade in 2026, retire my Boxster S and then start all over again with a different Porsche." Here's to Dave's plan becoming reality!



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

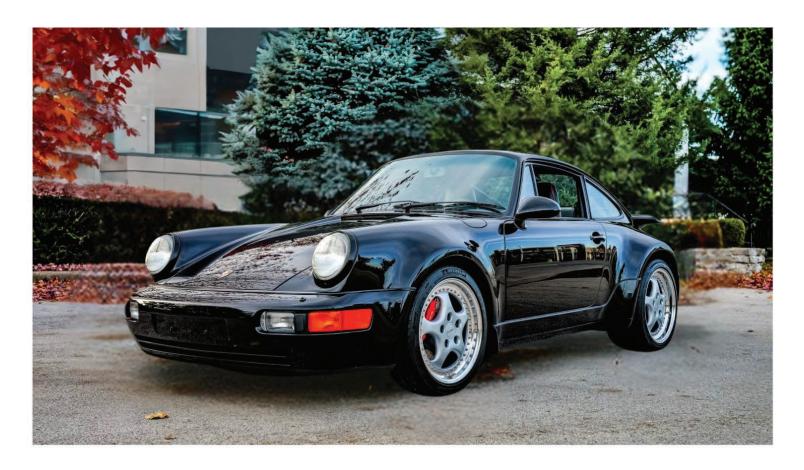


